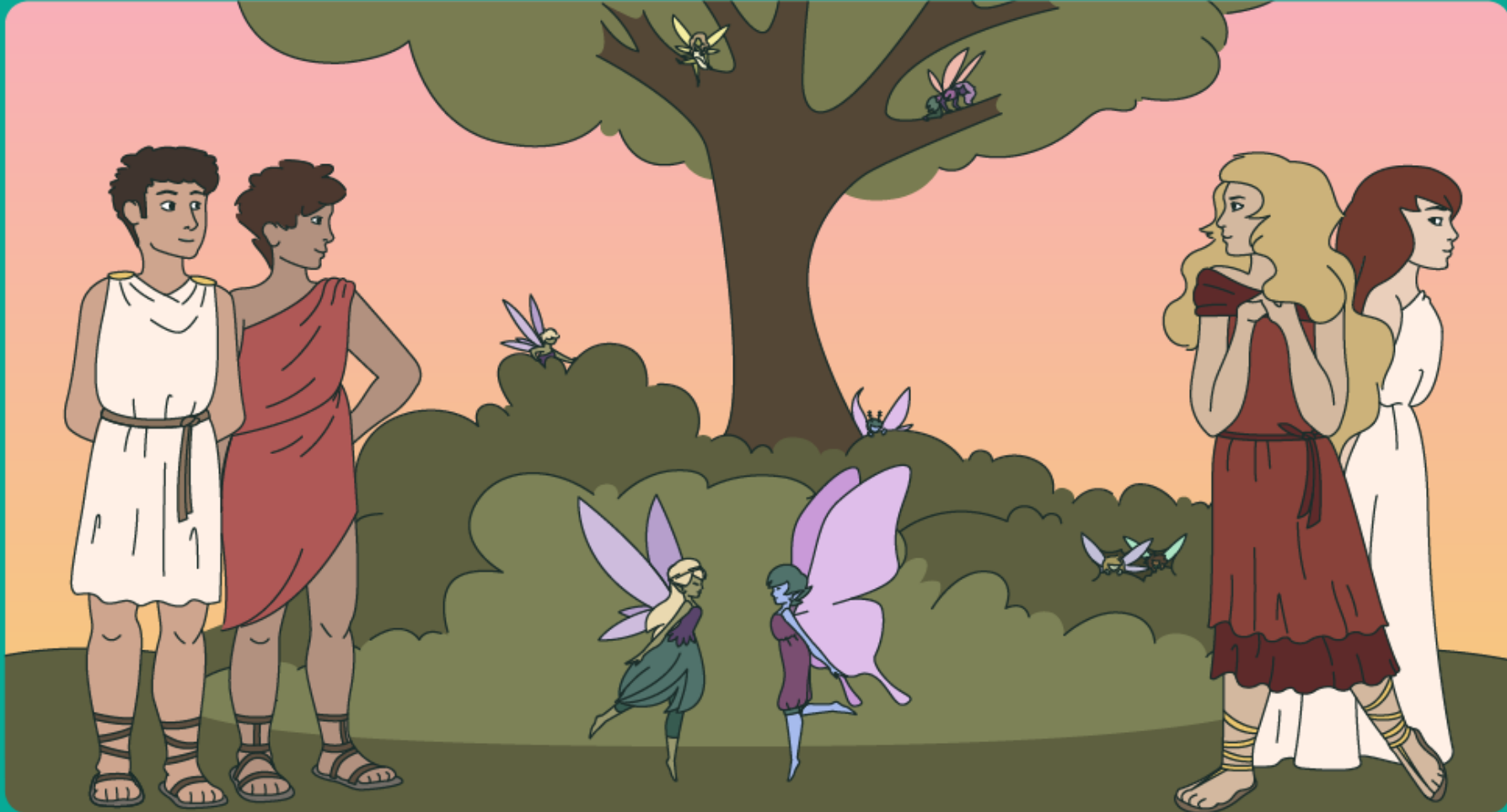


A Midsummer Night's Dream
