



- What type of text is this? How do you know? Persuasive leaflet, non-fiction. It contains information about a specific subject.
- What are the features used to persuade you to care for urban wildlife? Persuasive language, persuasive pictures, facts and evidence, reasons to supporting the Trust, information about the topic.
- What main points are raised in the leaflet persuading you to support the Urban Wildlife Trust? That these animals are friends, the trust rescues injured animals and educates the public, that the trust needs money to continue their work.
- Persuasive language is used throughout the leaflet. List some examples of powerful verbs or adjectives. Desperate, cared for, relies heavily, directly, friendly, urgent.


