






## Instant Wild: Exploring endangered animals & conservation

1. Draw lines below to match the words with their meanings:



The African elephant is the largest living terrestrial animal. Their upper lip and nose form a trunk, which acts as a fifth limb, a sound amplifier and an important method of touch.
