

Year 3 were very excited to not only wear their pyjamas to school, but also to bring their favourite book to school. In fact one pupil commented:-


"If I'm Headteacher of a school one day, I would ask pupils to wear their pyjamas to school every day!"

In the morning, children completed some poetry and designed book covers for their favourite books, brought in from home. Have a look at the wonderful creative designs:

Following on from this, we looked at the text 'Here We Are' by Oliver Jeffers and created some posters or 'single-page spreads' based upon planets:-





In Year 4, we have been learning about the book 'Here We Are' by Oliver Jeffers. It covers geography, science, maths, English and PSHE. We have completed lots of activities based on this book over the last week. Interestingly, when we first looked at the cover of the book, most of us said that it was not a book which appealed to us and we would not have chosen it from a bookshelf. However, we have now fallen in love with the book and most of us would now recommend it to a friend!

We made acrostic poems about our world and what we love about it, such as the different places to visit, our homes, sports and nature. We also love our friends and family and that we are "never alone on Earth", as Oliver Jeffers states in his book.

We did research about our Earth using books from the library and the internet. We created a mind map all about the world and our solar system.

On World Book Day, we came into school wearing our pyjamas which was great. Beatrice said, "I felt happy because I knew I would be comfortable reading and learning." In the morning, we read our books with other year groups. Most of us paired up with Reception or Year 1. Amber explained, "I really enjoyed this because it was nice to hear how the younger children could express their feelings about the books."

After our paired reading, we went to the book sale in school to select some books to buy with our money. "I felt really excited because there was lots of books to choose from and they all looked very interesting," said Ashley.

Later in the day, we put all of our learning together and presented a double page spread showcasing all of the wonderful facts we had learnt.

For World Book Day, we have enjoyed reading 'The Way Back Home'. We talked about the qualities you would need to be brave enough to go into Space. We will be writing our own NASA/ ESA job applications.

We discussed how fiction and non-fiction books differ, and talked about the scientific issues the boy and the alien would actually have had. We have really learned a lot from our Space topic last half term! For instance, we talked about how the Moon is not made of cheese (!) and how they wouldn't actually have been able to sit on the crescent. The crescent shape we see is one of the Moon's phases. It does make better illustrations for a picture book though. We also discussed how the rope would have to be incredibly long for the Martian to drop down to the boy.

Furthermore, we talked about how space is a vacuum. This would have caused several issues during the story. The boy wouldn't have been able to call up to the alien, as sound does not travel in space, due to the sound waves having no molecules to move through. Also, we were concerned for the boy with a lack of a spacesuit \bigcirc

Finally, we made our own space rocket mice and set them off!

Luca and Zara T explained how we made them. First, we cut out the white template. Then we put the template on top of a piece of card and cut it out. Then we decorated the rocket. There was a prize for the best design. (special mentions from Miss Fuller for Ethan who added a parachute to his, and to Luca, Zara M, Daniel, and Harry for great decoration).

Next we rolled up the card into a cone, making sure there was no hole at the top - or the air would push through. We went outside and fired off our space rocket mice! The reason why this experiment works is because of the air in the bottle. When you squash the bottle, you force the air up out of the bottle opening. This propels the mouse into the air. The force of the air makes the mouse fly!











 We found out that the bigger the bottle, the higher the mouse flew. The bottle with the skinnier part at the top made the mouse go higher, because it tunnelled the air into a smaller area. We had brilliant fun exploring the book. Please note, no actual mice were hurt in the making of the rockets Year 6 Class photo, collage 1,2) On World Book Day, the whole school came in PJs to be comfy when we read. There were a variety of different outfits ranging from slippers and PJs to onesies, dressing gowns and oodies. Everyone was very snug and enjoyed book themed activities. In Year 6, we created double-page spreads on our favourite books. Miss Tracy set up paired reading where children in older years read with children In younger years; it was very fun reading pages from our favourite books and looking at the pictures and illustrations.  Each table had a different genre: fiction, non-fiction, poetry, graphic novels and picture books. We would move to each table and write a bit about some books we chose in the certain genres. This is about a father and daughter laying foundations for their futures. They build many different things including: a door, a house, a watch, a hole and many more. As a class, we deduced that the things they build are metaphors for traits used in life. We uncovered that the door could represent new opportunities or starting afresh and the house could represent a place of safety or somewhere to relax.
